Did You Know?

- Nearly 13% of children in the United States are overweight. By contrast, 28% of children in the developing world are underweight. A total of 150 million children are malnourished in the developing world.
- About 24,000 people die each day from hunger or hunger-related causes throughout the world.
- The World Bank estimates that 1.2 billion people live on less than \$1 a day and 2.8 billion people live on less than \$2 a day.
- There are 1.7 million AIDS orphans in Uganda, which is the highest number of AIDS orphans in Sub-Saharan Africa. Nigeria and Ethiopia follow, with 1.4 million and 1.2 million AIDS orphans, respectively.
- \$17,960 was the official poverty line for a family of 4 (with two children) in the United States in 2001.
- Throughout the world, women are more likely to be illiterate than men. Nepal has the lowest female literacy rate. Nepal's female literacy rate is 13%. Its overall literacy rate, at 28%, is the lowest in the world.
- In the southern African countries of Malawi, Zimbabwe, Mozambique, Swaziland, Lesotho, and Zambia, about 14 million people are facing starvation. A continuing drought and other climate problems, widespread HIV/AIDS and government corruption all contribute to this problem.
